SOME FOUNDATION BASICS

Mission: The Rotary Foundation helps Rotarians to advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace by improving health, providing quality education, improving the environment, and alleviating poverty.

<u>Financial Structure:</u> The Rotary Foundation is organized as a public charity operated exclusively for charitable purposes and governed by a Board of Trustees. The operations of Rotary International, a member organization, are overseen by its Board of Directors.

Rotary International

The Board of Directors establishes policy for Rotary International and provides guidance that helps our clubs thrive. Clubs elect the members of the Board every year at the Rotary International Convention, and each director serves for two years.

Rotary Foundation

<u>The Board of Trustees</u> manages the business of The Rotary Foundation, the charitable arm of our organization that funds service activities. The RI president-elect nominates the trustees, who are elected by the RI Board to four-year terms.



HOW DOES THE DISTRICT GET THE FUNDING?

The DDF is based on the District contribution to the Rotary Foundation three years ago



^{*}Donation options include PolioPlus, peacebuilding programs, pooled endowed funds, the World Fund, Disaster Response Fund, or another district.

DDF IN 2022-23 ROTARY YEAR

- 2022-2023 DDF will be ~\$257,000
- Available for District Grants ~\$128,500
- Available for Global Grants ~\$128,500 + Carryover from prior years


DISTRICT GRANT VS GLOBAL GRANT

District Grants

Fund smaller-scale, short-term projects that address immediate needs in your community or abroad. They range < \$30,000

Global Grants

Support large international projects with long-term, sustainable outcomes in one or more of Rotary's areas of focus. They range from \$30,000 to \$400,000




DISTRICT GRANT

WHAT IS A DISTRICT GRANT

- Small scale, short-term activities in your communities and abroad
- Overall Project budget < \$30,000
- Same areas of focus as global grants
- •\$5000 per Rotary Club; \$2500 per Rotaract; \$1500 per Interact Club
- Max \$25,000 DDF towards project

LIFECYCLE: PREPARATORY WORK



- Each Club must execute a Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU")
 AND upload the executed MOU(s) to DACdb
- The 2023-24 Rotary Club President (current PE) must submit the club's 2023-24 Foundation Goals in Rotary Club Central before May 1, 2023
- Have at least one club member attend a Grants Management Seminar ("GMS")
- Develop a project based on an identified "Community Need"
- Use the Grants Module in DACdb to apply for the Grant. Add the required Email signatories for the year 2023-24 in DacDB
- Close out any open Grants from the past year
- No repeat projects





LIFECYCLE: GRANT SUBMISSION

Project Budget = District Contribution + Club Contribution

- District contribution
 - \$5000 limit per Rotary club
 - \$2500 limit per Rotaract Club
 - \$1500 limit per Interact Club
 - Maximum of 5 Rotary Clubs
 - Maximum of 2 Rotaract Clubs
 - \$25,000 DDF max per project
- Club contribution
 - At least 10% of the project cost

Plan a budget

Use Zero-based budgets and be sure to include estimates/documentation of requested expenses

CONSIDER PARTNERING with a Rotaract Club or Interact Club

Document how ALL CLUBS WILL BE ENGAGED IN THE PROJECT

- Target a project within the Rotary areas of focus
- Document how the project is sustainable
- All participating clubs are in good standing with RI
- Each Club must execute a Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU")
 AND upload the executed MOU(s) to DACdb. That means: Print, sign, scan, & upload (Rotary/ Rotaract/ Interact)
- Lead club completes Grant Module in DACdb before May 15th 2023



LIFECYCLE: DISTRICT APPROVAL

Grant closure

- District Grants Committee reviews each grant on a first come first serve basis and approves all or part of the club grant
- A Spending Plan is created, noting each approved club grant, and sent to TRF for approval
- TRF sends District Grant funds to the District as a block grant
- District 7600 funds Club grants per the approved Spending Plan



Do not start the Project before receiving the Grant money from the District

DDF contribution will be issued around August 1st

LIFECYCLE: PROJECT EXECUTION

- Wait to start the Project until TRF approves the District Spending Plan
 – generally around August 1st
- Contact the Grants committee if you need to change the scope of the project
- Keep records for audit purposes
- Do have a Public Image plan using Rotary Branding. Publicity, publicity, publicity!



LIFECYCLE: GRANT CLOSURE

Grant closure

- Clubs Submit final reports to District through DacDB
 - Copies of all Invoices & Receipts
 - Copies of both side of all checks
 - Pictures of the project
 - Details of Rotarian/ Rotaract/ Interact Engagement
- Maintain records for five (5) years
- District reviews the final report and closes the grant
- District submits final report to TRF



THE IMPACT OF OUR SERVICE

ROTARY'S IMPACT BUILDING BLOCKS

INPUT

The resources invested in a project

EXAMPLE:

Time, money, training, and materials used for project/program

OUTPUT

The immediate results of a project

EXAMPLE:

People trained, materials delivered, people and institutions engaged

The short-term or intermediate results of a project

EXAMPLE:

Adoption of systems and/or practices encouraged by project

IMPACT

The positive, long-term changes resulting from our actions

EXAMPLE:

Measurable improvement that otherwise would not have happened



CONFLICT OF INTEREST POLICY

- Exists when a Rotarian benefits financially or personally from a grant
- Benefit can be direct to a Rotarian or indirect to an associate of the Rotarian



IMMEDIATE DEADLINE

Before May 1st Close the 2022 – 23 District Grant

Before May 1st Add club foundation goals in

Rotary Club Central

Before May 15th Submit the Grant application

KEY TAKE-AWAYS FOR EACH CLUB


- Sign & Upload the "MOU" or NO grant!
- Attend a GMS or NO grant!
- Enter GOALS by MAY 1 or NO grant!
- Submit grant application by May 15th or NO grant!
- Submit Final Report for 2022/23 grant by MAY 1, 2023 or NO grant!
- No repetitive projects or NO grant!
- Sustainability projects or NO grant!
- Do not start the Project before receiving the Grant money from the District
- Use the Grant to make a difference in your community







HOW TO SECURE DDF FOR YOUR PROPOSED GLOBAL GRANT

- Review your proposed budget with Global Grants Committee
- Make individual and club donations to the Annual Fund in "honor" of the grant project.
- DRFC can approve DDF to replace "honored" giving (Cash Exchange Method-as funds available)
- Need more info? Ask



ROTARY SCHOLARSHIPS & PEACE SCHOLARS

Step 1: Application

 Contact Mike Little, District Subcommittee Chair mwlittle@vcu.edu to determine if candidate is eligible to be endorsed by Rotary District 7600. Must be prior to May, 2022. All Global Grant Scholar funding must be approved by John Padgett, District Foundation Chair.

Step 2: Submission

 Complete the application from the rotary.org website and download. Submit to District Subcommittee chair for review by May 31st, 2022. An interview is arranged with subcommittee with endorsement of local club

Step 3: Review

 Application is reviewed by the District Subcommittee. Recommendation forwarded to candidate and/or the Rotary Foundation in Chicago, ILL. by July 1st. Decision is made by November 2022 after world-competitive process
